For did you know that 99% of world Jewry do not believe Jesus was the Messiah? However, I believe I must begin my letter to you in the same manner.

How come? I must because I want to ask you one simple question, before I continue with my letter to you, and that question is "Why?" Why do you not believe in Jesus? Please do not give me your rabbi's reason or some anti-missionary response that you yourself perhaps do not even understand. What is your core reason for not believing in Jesus? Is it tradition? If so, are you still a regular attendee of a synagogue? Do you still seek to practice all 613 Torah laws? If not, why not? Is that not tradition as well?

Is it because you are afraid of what it might cost you in the community or in your family? Is it because you do not want to face the eternal reality of where your family who have passed on from this earth might be right now? Is it ...? Or ... is it you don't know why because you really have never been introduced to Jesus the Jewish Messiah? I would like to give you a few "WHY's" for Jesus if you will allow me.

<u>WHY?</u> He fulfilled dozens of Old Testament prophecies with His first coming and will fulfill dozens more with His second coming. <u>WHY?</u> The miracles He performed and His own words make him as C. S. Lewis once described to be either a lunatic, a liar, or the Lord. My faith and eternity is banking on the fact that Jesus is who He said He was, "I Am." <u>WHY?</u> The testimony of the disciples after the Resurrection is tangible evidence that they were eternally changed by their belief in Jesus the Messiah. I have lost friends because I have shared Jesus with them. Some have been subtle in their denunciation. Some have been more than obvious. As you might well imagine, and as some of you already know, I was rocked to my knees when I opened the Jewish newspaper and read the article that was directed solely and only towards me. I spent most of the day weeping, sometimes uncontrollably, for my friend and my friend's soul. And at times, it is still difficult to not break down into more tears as I can only hope and pray that my email was received, read, and considered by my friend.



My friend, as there is no other word I can fathom in describing this person, is in spiritual chains. I cannot be angry. I cannot be hurt. There is nothing on my part that requires me to offer forgiveness as there is nothing to forgive. My friend is simply lost, separated from God because the truth of Messiah Jesus has not been accepted or received.

I have done a great deal of thinking and praying in the last 10+ days. As I pray for my food, I always include the line –

"Lord, please save XXXXXX." As I sing praise choruses in church, I find myself in tears as I face the reality that my friend has nothing about which to praise God because my friend does not know Jesus.

However, I also find myself becoming angry and frustrated ... but not at my friend. I find myself frustrated by the spiritual apathy and lethargy of churches and Christians across America. My friend does not know better. My friend has only in the last few years been presented the entire Gospel message. My friend has lived in the center of the Bible Belt for a number of years and primarily, until we met at least, been able to walk through the evangelical epicenter of the United States without being "bothered" by the truth of the Gospel. There is something wrong with this reality!

But ... Christians and churches <u>should know better!</u> We have been given the mandate of Jewish evangelism in the Great Commission. We know the priority that Paul established for the Gospel when he wrote, "to the Jew first," in Romans 1:16. And still ... most of American Christendom does nothing about this calling, this mandate, and this priority of the Gospel! I can only pray for my friend's salvation. I can only plead with the American church to do something about the work of Jewish missions/evangelism. I guess I have only one more question ... will you stand with Tzedakah Ministries?
